

Self-Regulation and Lifelong Learning



About Christian Education


We are loved by God, our Creator, and in turn, we love God and value our neighbors.

At LIS, inquiry-based learning is a flexible, student-centered educational approach. In a diverse environment with teachers and students from various nationalities, we tackle global challenges together.







Student-centered Learning

Students actively engage in their learning, pursuing topics of interest and driving their own learning process.

Collaboration

Students work on projects and explore complex questions or challenges, developing teamwork and communication skills.

Transdisciplinary Learning

Inquiry-based projects often span multiple subjects, helping students connect different disciplines and gain a broad understanding of the concepts they are studying.

Reflection

Students regularly reflect on their learning experiences, evaluate their progress, and set goals for further inquiry and development.

Focus on Action

Learning involves practice and hands-on experience, emphasizing activities like experiments, field trips, and real-world problem-solving.

Global Perspective

Exhibition



School Lunch

School lunches are prepared under the supervision of a nutritionist in the Kyushu Lutheran School's cafeteria. Bringing lunch from home is also allowed.

School Uniform

Girls: The traditional sailor style from the Kyushu Women's Academy era.

Boys: Shorts with light blue polo shirts for summer and navy blazers for winter.

All uniforms are made from easyto-move materials that can be washed at home.

Transportation

Students can be dropped off and picked up by their parents or use public transportation. A school bus also operates on two routes for commuting to and from school.





Frequently Asked Questions

Question

What level of English proficiency is required? Is it acceptable for parents not to speak English?

Answer

Specific qualifications in English proficiency tests are not required. However, students must have a sufficient level of English to participate in class, And also a basic assessment of English proficiency will be conducted during the entrance examination.

Additionally, an English proficiency support program for beginning students will be provided. English proficiency of parents is not a requirement.

Question

Although it is referred to as an International School, are children with Japanese nationality eligible for enrollment?

Answer

Absolutely. The school embraces students from all backgrounds.

Question

Is there an after-school program like an extended care for students?

Answer

Yes. We provide after-school care for students.

Question

What kind of involvement do parents have with the school?

Answer

There is no association such as committees or assigned roles like PTAs in public schools. However, we organize regular parents meeting to foster collaboration between the school and parents to support an enriched school life.

Our Facilities

The school building has been renovated from the Akard Hall within the academy (RC, 2 floors, total floor area approximately 530m²). The front yard is a grassy area, providing a lively and relaxing space where students can play and converse.

Classrooms are equipped with desks that can be arranged in various layouts, creating an educational environment that facilitates easy communication and interaction among students.

School History

December 1925: Application for private school approval submitted to the Governor of

Kumamoto Prefecture, approved in February of the following year.

April 1926: Kyushu Women's Academy was established as a five-year Christian girls' school.

First Principal: Martha B. Akard

October 1928: On October 3, the school was designated by the Ministry of Education as having

academic standards equivalent to those of high schools. October 3 is celebrated

as the school's founding anniversary.

November 1941: Kyushu Women's Academy Foundation was established, and the school was renamed

Kyushu Women's Academy High School.

April 1947: Kyushu Women's Academy Middle School (New System) was established

April 1948: Kyushu Women's Academy High School (New System) and Kyushu Women's Academy

Kindergarten were established.

April 1975: Kyushu Women's Academy Junior College opened.

May 1996: Akard Hall was completed.

April 1997: Kyushu Lutheran College was established (co-educational).

April 2001: The name of Kyushu Women's Academy Middle and High Schools was changed to

Lutheran Academy Middle and High Schools, becoming co-educational. The corporate name was changed from Kyushu Women's Academy to Kyushu

Lutheran School.

April 2013: Lutheran Academy Early Childhood Education Center was established.

April 2015: Lutheran Academy Kindergarten and Early Childhood Education Center transitioned

to a combined certified kindergarten "Lutheran Kindergarten."

April 2016: Kumamoto City Kurokami Infant Nursery was fully transferred from Kumamoto City

to the school, reopening as Kyushu Lutheran School University Affiliated Kurokami

Infant Nursery.

April 2024: Kyushu Lutheran International School, Primary Division opened.
